OGSR UPDATES

E-PROPOSAL IS UP AND RUNNING!

If you've applied for a grant prior to 2021 here at TCNJ, you may remember using the OGSR grants notification and approval system, eGrants. This system, while somewhat functional, wasn't aging well and was a constant reminder to all that an effective software replacement was needed. Fortunately, our new system, eProposal, has been implemented and is up and running. Once you alert us that you are interested in an upcoming grant opportunity, OGSR (or your school's research administrator, if applicable) can enter an Early Notification in eProposal on your behalf.

Through eProposal, OGSR can:

- Automatically inform chairs, deans, and OGSR of intentions to submit a grant via the Early No-tification;
- Automatically add the information of each submission and award to the "Grant, Contract, and Sponsored Research Activity" in the new Faculty180 system;
- Request and receive approval from chairs, deans, and OGSR; and
- Connect you with IT and/or Facilities if your grant requires their assistance.

The purpose of the Early Notification is to inform the OGSR, your dean, your chair and other campus offices that you are planning to submit a specific grant; thereby prompting each to support your efforts by beginning their role in the proposal development process.

CONGRATULATIONS TO OUR FACULTY!

Salika Lawrence, Campbell Endowed Chair of Urban Education, has been awarded a grant from the Library of Congress for her project, Urban Education Roundtable (2021-2022). The Urban Education RoundTable uses a school-university partnership model to field-test strategies for increasing teachers' use of Library of Congress resources for rigor, student engagement, and critical conversations in high needs urban school districts.

Lauren Madden, Professor in Elementary & Early Childhood Education, has been awarded a grant from the New Jersey Sea Grant Consortium for her project, Enhancing Environmental Literacy Workforce Development. The College of New Jersey (TCNJ) and the nonprofit Save Barnegat Bay (SBB) will have undergraduate preservice teachers work alongside practicing NJ teachers through five phases. 2022-2024

Stuart Roe, Associate Professor in Counselor Education, has been awarded five more years of support from the Department of Health and Human Services SAMHSA program for his project, Youth Mental Health First Aid: Addressing Mercer County's Continuing Need. This project raises awareness and provides training and referral education across a number of constituencies to build the capacity of adults working with area youth to appropriately detect and respond to mental health issues.

SPIN DATABASE

OGSR subscribes to InfoEd SPIN (Sponsored Programs Information Network), a searchable database of federal, nonfederal, and international funding opportunities from more than 6,000 sources. You must sign in to search. Click the "Sign In" link on the <u>SPIN</u> page and create a new profile. Once you have created a user profile, OGSR will be notified via email and must approve the profile before you can sign in.

- Searching You can filter results to include specific sponsor types, project locations, and deadlines.
- Saving & Retrieving Your Searches Save your search queries and easily access those search results.
- Automation & Email Alerts Automate your funding searches! Have SPIN send you email notifications daily or weekly with recent funding opportunities so you never miss an opportunity or deadline.

SOME TIPS FOR COMMUNICATING WITH PROGRAM OFFICERS:

FIND THE ALIGNMENT: Earlier is better when contacting a Program Officer (PO) since it will prevent time wasted on developing a proposal that does not fit the program. OGSR seeks to assist faculty in finding opportunities that best align with their project. However, it can be useful to discuss this alignment between project and program with a PO since published material may not always reflect underlying considerations, as well program priorities can shift over time, while published materials remain unchanged. A PO's candid response may be a good predictor of success even though there is no guarantee.

EMAIL FIRST: Like the rest of us, POs are busy folks. Getting a cold call regarding a project they know nothing about probably isn't the best use of your time or theirs, and they may be hard to reach without a prior discussion. Therefore, once you identify the PO listed for your program, shoot them an email asking when it might be best to have a conversation. In your email, it's best to include the program you are inquiring about and a Pre-Abstract, which is a brief summary of your proposed project that provides your main objectives, methods and expected outcomes. Brief is best, more than half a page is generally considered too much.

GREAT QUESTIONS TO ASK: Remember that you are using this opportunity to obtain information that isn't readily available in print or otherwise. It is best that you review the solicitation and do your homework prior to the call. During the conversation, ask questions that focus on the big picture and try not to get buried in too much detail. Do use the following questions to shape your discussion:

- Does my project fit with your current priorities?
- What would you recommend to improve my chances for a favorable review?
- What are some common reasons for proposal rejections?
- How will this proposal be reviewed?

FOLLOW UP: A quick email to say thank you will keep the line of communication open.

Remember, don't be reluctant to get in touch with your PO, they are very willing to take the time to discuss your project.
